

Message from the Chair

Local industry news

I don't exactly have my finger on the pulse like some people around here do, but I have heard a *rumor* that the South Puget Sound Community College (SPSCC) is considering doing away with their geology department. Come on, SPSCC! You can't turn out brewers and not teach them about geology! Whether this is true or not, ex-Chair extraordinaire, Trevor, had this data to offer on the topic:

Based on the age demographics of the current geoscience workforce, with an average retirement age of 65, 27% of the existing geoscience workforce will be retiring by 2029. The number of geoscience graduates entering the workforce each year will not be sufficient to fill the gap created by these retirements and the addition of over 22,000 new jobs that are projected to be created in the profession by 2029. As a result, the expected geoscience workforce deficit will be approximately 130,000 full-time equivalent geoscientists by 2029.

Also, based on what we have seen happening in other states, how does everyone feel about a CEU requirement for maintaining your geology licensure? Let's discuss!
